 - B. A distortion of any one of the 4 Key Relationships can lead to material poverty
 - 1.God- the Poverty of Spiritual Intimacy (worship spirits or false gods)
 - 2. Creation- Poverty of Stewardship (failure to take dominion)
 - 3. Others- Poverty of Community (intertribal conflict)
 - 4. Self- Poverty of Being (marred identity)

- V. Poverty Alleviation is about reconciling relationships
 - A. It starts with the Repentance of our own sins
- VI. A few Implications for working with the materially poor
 - A. We MUST walk humbly. Christ is transforming US and the people we are working with.
 - B. Poverty alleviation must be "rooted in and flow back into" the local church
 - C. Use Asset-Based rather than Needs-Based Approaches
 - 1. Needs-Based focuses on the deficits and short-comings in the life of the person or community
 - 2. Asset-Based focuses on the the capabilities, skills, and the resources of the person of community
 - D. Encourage the use of Guidelines for Benevolence and Action Plans
